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HIDDENBROOKE SCHOOL SURVEY IS IN

The Hiddenbrooke School Committee (HSC) sent out a survey last winter to determine the number of school age children who live in Hiddenbrooke and whether parents would send their child to school here once the school is built and operational.

Thanks to all who participated in our survey! Our data shows us that an overwhelming 92% of those children ages 0-12 would attend a school in Hiddenbrooke! Many of you expressed interest in helping with school committee. While we haven't had any recent meetings, we will be contacting in you in the near future.

Although Vallejo schools have been hit hard by budgetary constraints, the district is still committed to building a school in Hiddenbrooke. In February, Gladys Philips-Evans, the superintendent for the school district, and Curt Johansen of Triad Communities, met to discuss the school site we have here in Hiddenbrooke and the opportunities for other land usage that could aid in building the school.

The Hiddenbrooke Community Association and Triad Communities want to continue to enhance the value and appearance of our community. To do this, regular information has been provided to homeowners on the Vallejo Municipal Ordinances and Hiddenbrooke Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions (CC&Rs) through direct mailings, the *Neighbors* newsletter and the electronic *Hiddenbrooke News*. Detailed information on the Vallejo Municipal Ordinances can be found at <http://www.ci.vallejo.ca.us/GovSite>. The CC&Rs were part of your house purchase documents, and a copy can be viewed at the Hiddenbrooke Community Association's (HCA) web page at <http://www.HiddenbrookeOnline.org>.

Since Hiddenbrooke's inception, Triad Communities has provided information and notifications to homeowners who have a situation that may conflict with a Vallejo Municipal Ordinance and/or a Hiddenbrooke CC&R. They will continue to do this until their development here is complete. Additional efforts will soon begin that support these actions by Triad, and that enhance the beauty and value of our community. A series of neighborhood walks will begin that Triad will use to help inform and educate homeowners regarding potential conflicts with CC&Rs and Vallejo Municipal Ordinances. This is a cooperative effort, and any Hiddenbrooke homeowner (HCA member or not) is welcome to participate.

Discussion are also beginning on how to transition the functions of the Architectural Review Committee after Triad Communities has sold all their property and turns full control of the Committee over to we residents. If you have ideas or want to participate, contact Geoff Albrecht (557-3330) or Jack Scott (649-9450), both of the HCA's Architectural Review Advisory Committee. ♦

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INTERIOR DESIGN

BRINGING THE OUTDOORS IN, AND THE INDOORS OUT

Spring is the time to admire the bright colors of nature and enjoy the sun shining through your windows. So, how do you continue that feeling inside your home?

In the past year or so we have seen a lot more color inside our homes. Color is back and in full force. Wall colors are brighter and deeper in hue; furniture, window treatments and accents are also appearing very vibrant. This does not mean however you need to run out and change your entire home to bring in the colors of nature.

To create the feeling of welcoming the outdoors in, start by opening your window treatments! If you have draperies, you might consider tiebacks for the spring. Allow the outdoor feeling in.

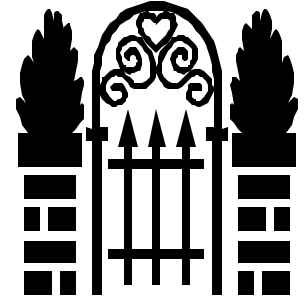

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PRIME OPEN SPACE IN OUR OWN BACK YARD

Directly behind Hiddenbrooke lies some of the most pristine land in Solano County. Known as the Sky Valley-Cordelia Hills Open Space, it is currently the focus of protection efforts from a wide variety of groups and individuals.

The Sky Valley-Cordelia Hills Open Space is a 10,000-acre landscape of rolling hills and coast live oaks, soaring hawks, and small creatures and plants of all kinds. The property is primarily grassland, though it contains habitats such as oak woodlands, wetlands and riparian areas. It is home to the federally endangered California red-legged frog, the state threatened Swainson's hawk, and several animals considered species of special concern, including golden eagles, short-eared owls, and plant species such as Tiburon buckwheat. The hills provide a vital watershed for the Suisun Marsh. The open space serves as a vital buffer between Fairfield, Vallejo and Benicia and provides beautiful views for motorists driving on I-80 and I-680.



of several partners, who are all committed to preserving the open spaces of Solano County for ranching, grazing, hiking, horseback riding and other recreational uses. They include the cities of Benicia, Fairfield and Vallejo, Solano County, and the Solano Land Trust. Citizens groups from around the county are also participating.

Two large parcels, historically known as Lynch Canyon and King Ranch, have already been purchased from

PG&E. Two more parcels, the Vallejo and Eastern Swett ranches, are the focus of current fundraising efforts and are still owned by PG&E. The last parcel in the open space is currently owned by the city of Santa Clara.

Every month, opportunities abound to tour the open space. The Solano Land Trust offers fascinating docent-led tours and hikes through the land. You can find out more information about how to help save this land, or get hiking access to it, by visiting the Land Trust's website at www.solanolandtrust.org or calling 432-0151. ♦

GOLF COURSE EASEMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE FORMED

The Golf Course Easement Advisory Committee was started as a result of letters to the Hiddenbrooke Golf Club from HCA and the City of Vallejo requesting that the Hiddenbrooke Golf Club work with HCA to bring certain areas of the golf course up to the City's minimum maintenance standards. Members of the committee are Mary Ann Gutierrez, Bobby Gutierrez, and myself, under the direction of Paul Norberg, Chair of the HMD Advisory Committee.

Mary Ann, Pat Norberg (standing in for Paul Norberg), Joyce Estes and I did a "ride around" to discuss what areas are under the control of Hiddenbrooke Golf Club. The committee then met with the Hiddenbrooke Golf Club Grounds Superintendent, and Steve Shimano, Hiddenbrooke Golf Club General Manger to discuss maintenance concerns. Hiddenbrooke Golf Club agreed to meet with the Golf Course Easement Advisory Committee on a regular basis. The purpose of these meetings is to discuss and make determinations on the easements and where the golf course meets public areas.

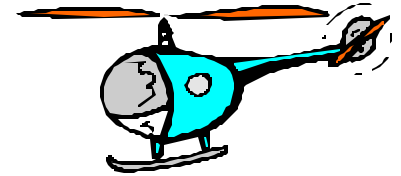
The Easement Advisory Committee has come up with a form which lists all the easements the Hiddenbrooke Golf Club has control over. On a monthly basis the committee will do a "ride around" to determine if these areas are being maintained and to document any concerns. This will then be given to the Hiddenbrooke Golf Club each month so that all concerns can be addressed and determinations made as to a course of action. On a regular basis, the Easement Committee and the Hiddenbrooke Golf Club representatives will meet to discuss any concerns not being addressed.

While it is taking a while to get the committee up and running, background material is being developed to ensure that all parties concerned — Triad Communities, Hiddenbrooke Golf Club, and the Hiddenbrooke Community Association — work together to keep our neighborhoods in tip-top condition.

If any of our members have a golf course easement assessed to their property and wish the Easement Advisory Committee to address any concerns, please contact one of the committee members. ♦



HIDDENBROOKE WATCH — HELICOPTER SPRAYING

On February 18th Five Dot Ranch conducted a significant aerial spray weed abatement program on their leased land around the Hiddenbrooke development to combat Yellow Thistles/artichokes, which are considered an invasive and noxious plant.

John Kurnik and Bob Schussel did some research for HCA and were able to obtain a description of the chemicals used on the hillsides, Transline, including copies of labeling information. Transline is the chemical of choice in the eradicating and control of Yellow Thistle, as it is considered relatively non-toxic, and is not a restricted chemical. A biologist from the County supervised the spraying. The biologist reported that the spraying was 200 yards from residences, and that while turning, the helicopter was never closer than 100 yards to any homes.

It was also discovered that Five Dot Ranch notified Triad Communities prior to January 27th regarding the spraying to get this information out to the residents to help minimize negative results on spray day, but this information was not shared with HCA or the residents. Because Transline is a non-restrictive herbicide, the County does not require notification of nearby residents. Five Dot Ranch was being a good neighbor by notifying Triad.

In the future, we have asked Five Dot Ranch to notify HCA so we can provide a notice to our members so that residents will have a choice to keep their children and pets indoors on spray day. If we get sufficient notice, we will include a notice in "Neighbors". ♦

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A MAN'S HOME IS HIS CASTLE — EVEN CASTLES NEED PERMITS

It has been said that a man's home is his castle. As such, we believe that, as the king and queen of our castle, we decide on what improvements or maintenance needs to be done and may do as we wish. However, we are part of a much larger community, the City of Vallejo, and also as members of the State of California. We all operate under the rule of law. These laws afford us equal opportunity and justice as we live together as a community of castle owners.

As homeowners in the City of Vallejo and members in the community of Hiddenbrooke, we submit ourselves to the ordinances and building codes of the community, City and State in which we live. By doing so, we are assured that, when we decide to improve our property or perform maintenance, we will be protecting both our property and lives, and honoring our neighbors and their interests, as well.

Hiddenbrooke is a very special community within the City of Vallejo. The City has a master plan that attempts to provide for all homeowners, while providing for individual interests and the community's overall benefit. As such, there are require-

ments for construction and maintenance as governed by the Uniform Building Codes and City ordinances. All homeowners must submit project plans to the Hiddenbrooke Architectural Review Committee (HARC) for approval. Those projects that receive approval from HARC may then submit plans to the Vallejo Planning and Building Divisions for approval and a permit for such work. You will find below a list of projects that require plans and permits:

1. Room Additions
2. Alterations to interior (remodel)
3. Patio Covers and Enclosed Patios including Screen Rooms and Sun Rooms
4. Gazebos
5. Storage Sheds (note that some sheds less than 120 sq.ft. in size may not require a permit but must conform to the master plan for HB and shall meet the setback and height requirements)
6. Gunite Pools and Spas (note that these projects may require the services of a licensed soils engineer)

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CONSTRUCTION GUIDE- LINES WITHIN HIDDENBROOKE

As part of a Hiddenbrooke Community Associations City Relations Committee, Tony Pearsall, Bob Colter, and I met March 10th with Director John Bunch and members of the Development Services Department. As part of our conversation, Leon McNeil, Chief Inspector (707-648-4387), asked that the following information be relayed to the residents of Hiddenbrooke.

CONSTRUCTION HOURS

Although the normal construction hours in Vallejo are 7am to 6pm Monday through Saturday, Leon said he will enforce the modified shortened hours that Triad has posted on each site. For example, no construction may begin before 9AM on Saturday mornings. This means that a contractor or builder cannot start work or move equipment around prior to the official posted start time.

DUST FROM CONSTRUCTION

If dust from a project is becoming a problem, please let Leon know. For residents near Parcel 2 (Olivewood, Thornbury, etc.), Western Pacific (Reflections) will be required to put water down each evening to try to minimize problems with dust.

DEBRIS AND EQUIPMENT ON SIDEWALKS AND STREETS

Although there has been vast improvement in keeping debris and equipment from blocking sidewalks and streets, Leon asked that he be notified about problems that are still occurring. He would also like to know if workers or construction vehicles are parked illegally or creating a hazard by blocking a lane of traffic, etc. For example, Leon is requiring that workers be bussed to the Parcel 2 construction site, rather than parking their vehicles on Overlook or other nearby streets. Construction vehicles will not be allowed to park near the site other than to load or unload. Please let him know if violations are occurring.

With Hiddenbrooke 50% built out, the City wants to do whatever it can to minimize the impact of construction on residents. I sincerely believe that the John Bunch's department is committed to this effort and wants to hear from you if any problems arise. ♦

7. Retaining Walls greater than 1'-0 (one foot) in height
8. Fences greater than 6'-0 (six feet) in height
9. Garage conversions
10. Other misc. structures as listed in the HB General Plan handbook such as shade structures, archways, green houses for plants, etc.

While this list may seem counter to the free will of a homeowner's desires to build and maintain their properties, it serves to protect your investments and the community as a whole. The Vallejo Planning and Building Divisions stand ready to assist and serve you, the castle owners of Hiddenbrooke. We have a great deal of information, knowledge and experience in the areas of development and construction.

Thank you for your kind support in making our community an excellent place to live. ♦
